Yu Jier Kou, our Grants Coordinator, brings impressive analytical skills as well as a strong awareness of principles of equity, diversity, and inclusion. As our Grants Committee increases its knowledge with the support of the Foundation's Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Advisory Council, we recognize how important it is to have representation on our committee that reflects the communities we seek to support.

We want Community Grants Committee members to be open to innovative granting processes, connected to a wide range of communities in Kingston and area, and sensitive to the rich potential of a diverse applicant group. One exciting equity initiative aims to improve access for potential **partners** who might not have the resources or capability to complete *effective* conventional written applications: We are piloting an oral application process.

COVID-19 presented unique challenges: The Federal Government helped us provide extra support for many of our trusted partners in 2020. Our volunteers stepped up to review even more applications in a timely manner, finding new ways to do pre-COVID in-person consultation remotely. In 2021 the Foundation decided to provide emergency operational support for partners in need. It has been an exciting first year for me as chair of this committee and I am proud of the work that has been done by our our Community Grants Committee to bring aid to the most vulnerable.

Finally, huge thanks go to all those **donors** who have contributed generously to the funds that allow us to grant. None of this could happen without you!

Grants Committee reviews and evaluates funding
requests for projects that enhance individual and
collective community well-being. The members'
recommendations are approved by the
Foundation's Board of Directors.

Your Commitment: You volunteer for a threeyear term and participate in at least one of the two review sessions per year (approximately 12 hours of work). At present, the review process and meetings are completed virtually. You will require access to the Internet. Diverse voices, ideas, and perspectives are the essence of community well-being. We welcome the perspectives of equity-deserving groups such as Indigenous Peoples, women, racialized individuals, persons with disability, persons who identify in the 2SLGBTQ+ community, and others who reflect the rich diversity of the Kingston and area communities.
